


Your signature on the envelope is imperative in order for your child to go. Plays this year are:

Inclement Weather

There is nothing like a period of inclement weather to remind all of us to make sure we are ready for emergencies. Many of us have revamped or added to our emergency supplies at home, now we need to make sure each family is “school ready” for an emergency. We have school-wide plans in the event of inclement weather, earthquake, or fire.

Most importantly, please make sure your child is prepared at school. Is your child’s emergency pack at school? Does your child bring a coat to school each day in case an emergency forces us outside for an extended period of time? Does your child know what to do in the various situations so he/she doesn’t have to call home? Does your child know what to do if he/she arrives home and no one is there?

In Case of Emergency



Keeping your contact information up to date is vital in an emergency. When your child has been injured at school or is sick, the office needs to have accurate contact information. It is also necessary for teachers to have up to date contact information to keep you informed regarding your child’s progress. Please send a note in with your child if you have a change to your phone number(s), address, or email information.

Learn All About Kindergarten Day

On Saturday, February 20, the Olympia School District will hold its annual "Learn All About Kindergarten" informational event starting at 10 a.m. at Capital High School.

During the event parents will learn about a variety of topics related to kindergarten and school in general, including how to register for kindergarten, kindergarten program options, riding the bus, and how to use the district's Family Access student information system to stay updated on everything from grades to lunch accounts.

A reminder that children should be 5 years old by August 31, 2016 to be eligible to start kindergarten this fall.

The event is geared for adults of incoming kindergartners in the Olympia School District. Child care is not provided. Capital High School is located at 2707 Conger Ave. N.W. in Olympia.

Spell-check Pitfalls

Q: My daughter says spelling is no big deal because we have spell-check and autocorrect. How can I convince her that spelling still matters?

A: Spell-check and autocorrect are handy tools. But they're not foolproof, and they're not always available.

When your child writes a school report, sit with her while she runs spell-check. Together, look for examples of mistakes caused by relying on the computer. This often happens with homophones (*it's* and *its*, *you're* and *your*), for instance. She'll need to know the difference to use the correct word.

Also, help her think of situations where she won't have spell-check or autocorrect, such as taking a test or using special software that doesn't include the feature. And if she can't spell a word, she may not recognize it when she reads, which can interfere with her comprehension.

Finally, point out that if she studies her spelling words, thinks carefully about how words are spelled, and proofreads her work, she'll find that the best spell-check is in her own head!♥
